I explained that no one else had made people understand that wars were not necessary and that there was enough of everything if it were shared, and that is why we choose to remember him after all these years. That’s all he needed to know. On Christmas day he burst into song singing Happy Birthday to Jesus. His parents gave me a look and I just shrugged my shoulders.

As a child I expected Jesus to go the way of Santa, the tooth fairy and the Easter bunny too. Year after year I expected to be told that Jesus and God were stories to keep children in line. It amazed me that adults would go to such lengths as to

build buildings and shrines to keep the myths alive. When I finally “got” that people actually believed the stories, I became a seeker. About forty years ago I was introduced to Religious Science and found a home where I could put Jesus and God in a spiritual rather than a dogmatic context.

GET TO KNOW YOUR COMMUNITY BY JUNE GUMZ REV. LARRY KING — A BLEND OF SPIRITUAL AND PRACTICAL

In this section of our newsletter, I have written about musicians, leaders in PCSL and even myself. Today Rev. Larry King is my subject. It occurred to me when he was ordained that many of us don't know much about our minister except what we see and hear on Sundays. It is time to rectify that.

Rev. Larry's family was ambivalent to organized religion, which caused him to distrust or avoid most things religious. He considered himself an agnostic since "if you can't prove something, why discuss it." However, spiritual stuff happens and Larry began to believe in a higher power at work in his life. It wasn't until a friend introduced him to a Science of Mind Center ten years ago that he realized that other people thought the way he did. "What a blessing to celebrate life in a way that recognizes all paths to a loving and inclusive God."

In his 20s and 30s Larry was active politically. He was president of the Gay People's Alliance in college and took a leadership role in gay rights and environmental issues. His grandparents found out he was gay when they saw him on television trying to organize the first Pride Parade in Eugene. Now his activism is more personal. He lets people get to know him, a nice guy who is gay, smart, a vegetarian and a devoted recycler. He believes that people take in new ideas and ways of expression by seeing it in people they trust and enjoy being around.

When I asked Rev. Larry about his most memorable epiphany I had to settle for three. His family was rather stoic and therefore emotions were something to keep under wraps. His first epiphany was that feelings were healthy and good. The second was that he could choose his feelings and thirdly Larry realized that emotions, like thought, are something that with practice can simply be chosen!

Something that can raise goose bumps on Rev. Larry is listening to a speech given by Martin Luther King Jr. "Here was a modern man who stood up for equality, peace and inclusivity, even when it meant profound compromise in his personal affairs and ultimately the sacrifice of his life." Larry likes the fact that our heroes can be powerful, magnificent and still have a flaw or two. They can be divine and human at the same time.

In the coming decade, Rev. Larry thinks he will become more mystical. At present, he sees himself as a blend of spiritual and the practical. He assures me that we won't be into crystal healings and Ouija board sessions, but there will be a greater

openness to inner wisdom, intuition and seeing God in all life.

If you want to have some fun, ask Rev. Larry about his most embarrassing moment. It involves a theater with about 500 people and Larry on stage in a compromising position. That's all he would tell me.
